Amid the hustle and bustle of this Christmas season I'd like to offer you this reflection: have you ever held a newborn baby in your arms, perhaps your son or daughter or grandchild? Then you know you experienced a mystery. This baby is so tiny, so vulnerable, so helpless. The baby can't feed itself; it can't tell you what it wants; it can't even roll over. But if you offer the baby your little finger, prepare to have the baby wrap his or her little hand around it tightly, the way a king or queen would hold a scepter of power in times past. In that moment you know if you had to give your life to this baby, you'd do it gladly because you know a truth greater than yourself.

Now imagine yourself back in time to that stable in Bethlehem. You approach this manger and see this magnificent newborn child lying on a bed of straw, and you ask his mother next to him if you can hold him. She picks him up and places him in your arms, and you are beside yourself with joy.



And now that baby grabs your little finger and clasps it tightly. Here is a relational God, baring God's self in complete vulnerability, and inviting you into an intimate relationship. What would you be willing to do for that Love? That's what Christmas is really about! Oh, maybe in the back of your mind races thoughts of the sacrifices this frail baby will make in his future for not only you, but for all humankind, but all that takes a back seat in this singular moment. As you marvel at those tiny fingernails on that tiny hand that clasps so tightly to you, you are over whelmed with emotions that you cannot ever put into words. Maybe this Christmas season is time for us to do something new – to adopt a new understanding of Christ and Christmas. We should vow to greet and experience others with the same vulnerability and love that the infant Jesus showed the world. Let's ask God to birth a new attitude in us that helps us see the Christ hidden in everyone we meet.
