From Light to Darkness, from Darkness to Light

Beginning with Ash Wednesday we join Jesus as he turns away from one phase of his life and ministry and heads off to another. We accompany him on the road to Jerusalem during the forty days of Lent that end on that ominous dark night when he and his twelve disciples gather in that upper room to share the meal we now call the Last Supper. That journey takes us from the joyful light of Jesus' ministry of proclaiming the glorious good news of the arrival of God's Kingdom to excited crowds, miraculous feedings, healings, and driving out demons galore to a growing darkness day by day as Jerusalem draws

closer and opposition and threat increase to Jesus and his message: "The time that we have all been waiting for has finally come! God's kingdom is at hand! Repent — change your hearts and your lives, and believe the glad tidings of God's grace and mercy now offered to all!" (Mark 1:15)

In the words of the great Shaker hymn, Lord of the Dance,

I danced on the sabbath and I cured the lame, the holy people said it was a shame; they whipped and they stripped and they hung me high; and they left me there on a cross to die. I danced on a Friday and the sky turned black; it's hard to dance with the devil on your back...

And then on the morning of the third day,

They buried my body and they thought I'd gone, but I am the dance and I still go on... I am the life that will never, never die;

I'll live in you if you'll live in me; I am the Lord of the Dance, said he.

As John's gospel tells us of Jesus, God's Living Word made flesh, "What has come into being in (or through) him was life, and the life was the light of all people. The light shines in the darkness and the darkness did not overcome it." (John 1:4-5)

The road we travel on together this Lent/Easter season is a journey from light into darkness, and from the blackest darkness of Good Friday into the searing brightness of God's glory in the Risen Jesus on Easter morning — a brightness that will never fade or grow dim. A light emerging from darkness of despair and death that, by God's grace and the power of the Holy Spirit, we might have the opportunity to see rekindled the loving smiles of hundreds of volunteers who serve the Lord and in the smiling faces of the hundreds who are served weekly through the ministry of St. Paul; a light shining bright in the face of a child participating in the YPC after-school program; a light shining ever brighter in the discovery of the depth and breadth of God's love in a Tuesday, Saturday, or Sunday time of community worship or a Wednesday evening Las Amigas; a piercing light that goes forth into the darkness of a neighborhood in need, bringing the never-ending, undefeatable light of God's powerful agape love in and through the Risen Jesus.

Dance, then, wherever you may be; I am the Lord of the Dance, said he. And I'll lead you all wherever you may be, and I'll lead you all in the dance, said he.

Let us dance on together as God's St. Paul people!

In February ESOL tutors **Mary Ellen Beardmore** and **James Coe** were in our volunteer spotlight, and this month we highlight another of our wonderful tutors, **Jan Dice**:

Q: Tell us a bit about your background.

A: "I am a child of God, and I want to use every minute of the precious time that He has given me since my healing of cancer in 1990 to serve Him. I have been married to my High School sweetheart (first date 1957) for 50 years in October (he's still my SWEETHEART). We were blessed with two adopted children (a 43-year-old son who gave up his law practice to become an Episcopalian priest, and a 37-year-old daughter who gave us our precious grandson). I taught Spanish in high school for 32 years and retired three years ago to help care for our grandson who was diagnosed as autistic at that time. I enjoy music (choir and bells at church), mission trips, theater, and caring for my fellowman (Beavercreek FISH, Miami Valley Women's Center, and Good Neighbor House)."

Q: How did you hear about the ESOL tutoring opportunity at St. Paul UMC?

A: "Our dear friend, Joy Bossman, a member of St. Paul UMC, told me about the program, and she knew how much I missed my 'kids'

at Spring Valley Academy."

Q: How long have you been tutoring?

A: "I did Spanish tutoring here in my home while my children were growing up, and this is my third year in the ESOL program at St. Paul."

Q: Describe what you do as a tutor. Do you enjoy it?

A: "I enjoy my students, and I desire so much to help them, but I'd much rather be teaching Spanish. I taught English on four different mission trips in China and Thailand, and realized just how difficult my native tongue is to learn with all it's exceptions to the rules!?! As a tutor, I spend a lot of time on the oral with questions and answers, and group pronunciation drill. I try to use vocabulary that is practical for everyday situations. I have a lot of fun teasing — especially with 'I don't + verb' rather than 'I no + verb,' I so very much look forward to meeting with my class each week, and hope that they feel at ease and are encouraged to practice their new language."
