Sandpaper for the Soul

In my nine years at St. Paul, I have been utterly amazed at how many different folks touch base in our church every single day. It is where the grace of those who give and serve is exchanged with the grace of gratitude from those who are marginalized and need our help. St. Paul is an oasis of assistance in the middle of the poorest zip code in Dayton. And honestly we could not do what we do without your relationships and partnerships.

At St. Paul I volunteer as an escort in the food pantry. Now we have a choice pantry, which means instead of just handing each client a bag of groceries, we have what might be described as a small grocery store in our church basement and we give each client a choice of items, and my job is to escort clients through and advise them how many of each item they can select. My job is to make this experience as pleasant and as gracious as possible. Sometimes that is hard because working on Thursday, the last pantry day of the week finds our pantry out of a lot of items which leaves the client with little or no choice. Sometimes it is hard like when I was taking a man through who just lost his job and for the first time in his life had to accept charity to feed his family.

You know it is easy to love mankind in general; loving mankind in particular, when they are standing right in front of you, presents the real challenge. I have to confess that when I first came to St. Paul, I was more at home reading a book or working on budgets with spreadsheets, but I have discovered that immersing myself in messy humanity, talking to folks, and, yes, developing new relationships is sort of like "sandpaper for the soul." I now think that if God wants me to love more and more people, I need to exercise my heart more to that end, and I know no better way to do that than to get to know as many folks on the edge as I can. Because like it or not, we are all brothers and sisters and equal members of God's one big, happy, dysfunctional family. So I urge you all to take a risk sometime and come join us for Tuesday lunch or Saturday breakfast and sit and eat with the people there and talk to them. Seriously! And whether you are new or old to St. Paul, if you have an idea on how to improve our ministries or start a new one, please tell us because we really want to do more in our neighborhood.

On Saturday mornings I lead a short devotion and hymn in the sanctuary before we all file into the activity room for breakfast. Recently I was eating breakfast while sitting next to Mike, a soft-spoken man of Arab descent. Honestly my mind started drifting and I was wondering if I had said anything in the sanctuary before breakfast that registered with anyone there. Then Mike jarred me from my daydream with a question, "Do you know what the folks on the street call this church?" "No," I answered. And he replied, "They call this place the little church with the big heart!" It made me smile: grace exchanged for grace!

And if St. Paul is the little church with the big heart, then all our partners become the cardiologist because it is your generosity and active participation in St. Paul's ministries that allows St. Paul's heart to beat stronger and louder reaching more and more people in need. And for that I say, "Thank you, thank you, thank you! Blessings in Christ, Dan Vanoli In his book, Holy Currencies, Eric Law states that our roles as God's children are to be part of the recirculation of resources so that all living things on earth may share God's abundance. For more than 132 years St. Paul has stood on the corner of Huffman and Fourth in East Dayton offering a place for the people of the neighborhood to build relationships. Over the years, the people that have circulated in and out of the church have changed and the mission of the church has changed but the building remains steady, wellworn but well-loved from the many uses and ministries. St. Paul has always looked for ways to use it's resources to offer blessings throughout our part of Dayton. Doing so required the sacrifice or letting go of preconceived ideas and facing the hard truth of a neighborhood sliding from middleclass to high poverty. There have been times when resources were poor but still we recirculated what we had out of our abundance and that is why the church remains here still today.

Our faith in the power of God's abundance and the gracious life of Jesus has brought us to a new day once again as we take part in the work of Holy Currencies through the West Ohio Conference and the Miami Valley District. Currently, we are aligning our ministries and leadership roles around the six currencies: Relationship, Gracious Leadership, Truth, Time and Place, Money, and Wellness. It is our hope that, together with our congregation and ministry partners, we will continue the work of mission in a neighborhood that has so many needs.
