Just a few days ago, we celebrated the birth of Jesus. Jesus spent his life living out one mission: "I came to seek and to save the lost" (Luke 19:10). And every moment of the last three years of Jesus' life, he prepared his followers to do the same thing: "Go and make disciples of all nations....." (Matthew 28:10).

The mission hasn't changed in 2000 years. Here at St. Paul, that is our call. Make disciples of Jesus for the transformation of the world. No matter what we're doing, no matter how we're doing it, it is all the means to one end: making disciples. Telling new people about Jesus and helping to grow the ones who are here into radical followers of Jesus Christ!

So how do we do it? How do we live out this great commission? Here at St. Paul Church, we spent the last several months looking at areas where we thought we could be most effective at doing that one thing: making disciples! And those five areas will be our focus for 2012.

First of all, we are **committed to continuing to revitalize our worship**. Are we reaching new people AND growing the ones who are here? We've made some changes in worship the past several months designed to reach new people for the sake of Jesus and to help people take another step toward becoming radical followers. As we move forward, what things must we do to create an atmosphere where people will meet God and grow in Him?

Secondly, we want to **reclaim our community for Christ**. What would happen if St. Paul began to stand up and take the neighborhoods surrounding it back for Christ? It's time for us to try. Getting out into the community. Meeting the people. Building relationships. Discovering their needs, wants and desires. Praying for them and the neighborhood. Becoming a part of it again. Finding out from them what the church they would attend would look like. And finding creative ways to connect their hearts and passions to God through the work we do as a church.

Thirdly, we want to **reenergize and refocus our children and youth ministries**. Young Peacemakers Club and the Youth Leadership Circle are both strong ministries. But what could we do better? How could we use these ministries to make disciples? Maybe we could better connect to the families of the children who are involved in the program here at St. Paul! What if some of us made a regular commitment to follow up with kids and their families from the program. Not just the program staff, but those who are a part of the church family here at St. Paul.

Fourth, we are **recreating our Hispanic ministry to be more "parish-focused."** We have a connection with many Hispanic families and access to many more who are not already here. It is estimated that 10 to 15% of the population in east Dayton is Hispanic. This community needs a church. And we have the opportunity to do more! What would that look like?

Finally, we are **developing a discipleship plan!** Once people have connected, in one way or another through our intentional efforts to bring them into relationship with Christ, we must provide opportunities for lifelong growth and transformation. If we will ever really grow, then we must be intentional about it. How? Through prayer and study and accountability and service, followers grow in their love for God and passion for His kingdom.

We have before us an incredible task! To make disciples of Jesus for the transformation of the world. Led by the Holy Spirit and working together as a team united for the sake of Christ, imagine what we can accomplish. I am excited about how God may use us to accomplish his task as we are obedient to His call in 2012. God bless us all!

Tax season has arrived and in today's economy more people are looking to squeeze every dollar out of their tax return. Tax filing can be confusing and difficult and too many tax filing services require fees and many offer Refund Anticipation Loans (RALs) which strip millions in fees each year from the earned-income tax credits paid to working parents, ultimately reducing the amount of their tax return.

St. Paul UMC is partnering with The Benefit Bank (TBB), a web-based, counselor-assisted program to help low to moderate income wage earners obtain **FREE** assistance in filing federal and state income tax returns, claiming the Earned Income Credit (EIC) and Child Tax Credit.

People with household incomes of less than \$60,000 can come to St. Paul UMC to file a tax return at no cost. Tax refund can be received within seven to ten days through TBB e-file. Call 937-252-4467 to make an appointment.



The Human Relations Day offering is helping students at Philander Smith College engage in ministries that advocate for solutions to injustice, hunger, homelessness and other social ills.

Let's Get Radical: Think Justice

Radical means "from the root or foundation." That is how Jesus changed lives and how we, his followers, are called to change the world.

Being in ministry with the poor requires a radical or fundamental approach to overcoming not just the consequences but also the causes of poverty. It's a matter of justice.

Your Human Relations Day offering supports vital community ministries that teach and advocate for justice, especially among people struggling to survive in the margins of society.

For example, students at United Methodist-related Philander Smith College in Little Rock, Ark. Are becoming more involved in social concerns with help from the United Methodist Voluntary Service program. Combing academics with activism, the tiny, historically black college-with "Think Justice" as its motto-is teaching students to pursue justice for a better world.

During one Thanksgiving week students explored and responded to the worsening plight of hunger ad homelessness in central Arkansas. They hosted a Faces of the Homeless symposium, volunteered at a shelter and soup kitchen, slept in cardboard boxes outdoors overnight and collected food and clothing for 100 needy families.

Other lessons have come from a letter-writing campaign to lobby for tougher drunk-driving laws and public forum with consciousness-raising guest speakers.

Your gifts to Human Relations Day provide avenues to restored relationships through ministries like Youth Offender Rehabilitation, Community Developers self-improvement programs and United Methodist Voluntary Services community advocacy programs.
